### Annex 3.

### Annual update on application of reduced cost-recovery rates in 2019

- 1. The Executive Board in its decision 2013/9 endorsed "a general, harmonized cost-recovery rate of 8 per cent for non-core contributions," and further endorsed the following differentiated cost-recovery rate structure: "(a) a harmonized 1 percent reduction for the thematic contributions at the global, regional and country-level in UNDP, UNFPA and UNICEF (8 per cent 1 per cent = 7 per cent), with the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN-Women) maintaining the 8 per cent as a temporary arrangement; and (b) maintaining the existing preferential rates for government cost-sharing, South-South contributions and private-sector contributions."
- 2. In the same decision, the Executive Board also decided that on an exceptional basis, and when the urgency of the circumstances requires, "the Executive Director of UNFPA may consider granting a waiver of the cost-recovery rates on a case-by-case basis, taking into account specific priorities, modalities that incur lower management costs, and harmonization goals, and that the Executive Board will be informed of these waivers in the annual financial reports;".
- 3. In the decision 2018/21 from September 2018, the Executive Board requested "UNDP and UNFPA, together with UNICEF and UN-Women, to reduce the granting of waivers lowering the agreed cost-recovery rates and to provide an update on the steps taken in this regard, including on the application of waivers across their organizations, to the Executive Board at its annual session in 2019".
- 4. UNFPA has registered 13.7 per cent growth in gross contribution revenue from other resources as compared to 2018. This growth was driven in particular by a 60 per cent increase in contributions coming through United Nations inter-agency transfers; a 19 per cent increase in funding recorded for UNFPA-specific thematic funds and a 4 per cent increase in funding recorded from programme countries. These trends confirm UNFPA's continued efforts to implement the recommendations outlined by the 2016 resolution of the Quadrennial Comprehensive Policy Review, and to create flexible and dynamic funding modalities that respond to the needs and priorities of its Member States.
- 5. This sustained growth, and in particular the growth in contributions channeled through United Nations interagency transfers, has had an impact on the effective cost-recovery rates inherited from other United Nations entities that had agreed with their donors to carry over the limits to the rates if transferring a portion of contributed amounts to other entities, including UNFPA.
- 6. For the purpose of the 2019 disclosure, UNFPA has further harmonized with the United Nations Development Program its interpretation and reporting of the cost-recovery information to the Executive Board. Multilateral agreements with reduced cost-recovery rates inherited from other United Nations entities will no longer be treated as waivers, but will continue to be transparently disclosed, including their financial impacts. As a result of this presentation change, the number of cost-recovery waivers has notably decreased compared to previous years.
